Fly Like a Bird (Air)

LENGTH:Three 30 minute periods and one 10 minute periodCURRICULUM:Science, Writing, ArtOBJECTIVES:Student will compare the body of a bird to that of a plane by discussion, Haiku, and art.EDUCATIONALLEVEL: Grades 3 - 4

## MATERIALS:

- 1. Pet bird
- 2. Bird skeleton
- 3. Paper
- 4. Watercolor paints
- 5. Black fine tip markers
- 6. Richard Cronner's Miracle of Flight

## PROCEDURE:

- 1. Have students examine the pet bird and, if possible, let bird sit on each child's finger. Discuss why the bird is so light.
- **2.** Inspect the bird skeleton, noting the aerodynamic body, hollow bones, wing shape, thin skull, and feathers.
- 3. Discuss how the characteristics identified in step 2 help the bird to fly.
- **4.** Review Haiku, the Japanese poetry form which has 17 syllables written in 3 lines in a 5-7-5 syllabic pattern.
- 5. Instruct students to write Haiku describing a bird in flight.
- 6. Instruct students to paint a watercolor scene to illustrate their Haiku poem.
- 7. When the water color painting is dry, students should use the markers to write their Haiku poem on their watercolor scene.

## POINTS TO DISCUSS:

1. How is our body different from a bird's body making it impossible for a person to fly?
