Michigan

The Commission for Logistics and Supply Chain Collaboration was created by PA 76 of 2013, signed into law by Governor Snyder in June of 2013. The Commission is housed in the Michigan Strategic Fund and replaces the old Michigan Commission on Supply Chain Management and Development. The 10-member Commission will include members who have education in, experience with, or knowledge of supply chain management and logistics, including, but not limited to, individuals representing commerce, transportation, border operators, warehousing, local economic development agencies, and institutions of higher learning. The Commission is charged with advising appropriate state agencies on methods, proposals, programs, and initiatives involving freight transportation and supply chain management in this state that may stimulate state economies and provide additional employment opportunities for this state, creating avenues of communication between this state and Ontario and the federal government of Canada, as well as other state, regional, and local governments, concerning economic development, trade and commerce, transportation, and industrial affairs concerning supply chain management, surveying and auditing how other states have used supply chain management capabilities to attract industry and determining which industries in this state would benefit from supply chain coordination. Members are terms expiring at the pleasure of the Governor.

Minnesota

The <u>Minnesota Freight Advisory Committee</u> (MFAC) is a partnership between government and business that meets quarterly to exchange ideas and recommend policy and actions.

The goal is to develop and promote safe, productive and sustainable freight transportation in Minnesota.

- Ensure freight transportation needs are addressed in the planning, investment, and operation of Minnesota's transportation system.
- Establish guidelines to measure and manage the state's freight transportation needs.
- Provide input and direction to MnDOT's freight investment committee on freight transportation policies, needs, and issues.
- Recommend program and research areas for MnDOT follow-up and direction.
- Represent the needs and requirements of freight transportation to the public, elected officials, and other public agencies and organizations.

Oregon

Oregon Freight Advisory Committee. In 2001, the Oregon Legislature formalized the Committee through the passage of House Bill 3364 (now ORS 366.212). This legislation calls for the ODOT Director to "appoint members of a Freight Advisory Committee to advise the Director and Oregon Transportation Commission (OTC) on issues, policies and programs that impact multimodal freight mobility in Oregon." This includes identifying high-priority freight mobility projects for consideration in ODOT's Statewide Transportation Improvement Programs (STIP) and for the *Connect*Oregon program. The Freight Advisory Committee also advises on transportation policy related to goods movement.

Texas

Washington

In January 2013, FMSIB created the <u>Washington State Freight Advisory Committee</u> (WAFAC) as directed by Section 1117 in MAP-21. The WAFAC is responsible for advising the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) on its State Freight Plan that will be submitted to the U.S Department of Transportation (USDOT). This document will also be submitted to the Washington State Transportation Commission in support of the Washington Transportation Plan update. Section 1117 recommends the Advisory Committee include representatives from a cross-section of public and private sector freight stakeholders, including ports, shippers, carriers, freight-related associations, the freight industry workforce, the state transportation department, and local governments.
