### Why Evaluation?

- Assist stakeholders in determining the effectiveness of SRTS programs and projects
- Increase support for SRTS programs
- Demonstrate that an effort is worthwhile
- Identify changes needed for improvement
- Identify efforts that should be discontinued





#### **Evaluation Questions**

- How do students get to/from school? How is this changing over time?
- How safe are school arrival/dismissal areas?
- How are schools implementing SRTS programs and projects?

#### Local and Statewide Evaluation

- Local programs encouraged to use these tools to plan & evaluate their work
  - Recommendations provided in User Guide
- Central statewide database
- On-going analysis and reporting of statewide results







#### School Environment and Policy Self Assessment

- Meant to be completed at your desk
- The person completing the assessment should be aware of the school environment and policies
- Questions Address:
  - Policies and practices around walking and biking
  - School property
  - Arrival and dismissal procedures
  - School zone environment







### Why Use This Tool?

- Planning and prioritizing changes to create a more appealing and safer walking environment in the school zone
- Measure progress over time in your Safe Routes to School Program
  - Infrastructure
  - Non Infrastructure

#### School Zone Hazard Observational Assessment

- How safe are school arrival/dismissal areas?
- Requires in person observation with the help of volunteers
- Tracks different travel modes and selected unsafe behaviors using a tally system
  - Distractions
  - Illegal parking/pick up
  - Unsafe crossing
  - Helmet usage
- Not intended to track mode shift







### Why Use This Tool?

- Identify hazards that need to be addressed and plan infrastructure and/or non-infrastructure changes that will reduce hazards
- Measure changes in unsafe behavior and events in an individual school







### Conducting the Observation

- Observe all people entering a two-dimensional observation space, such as a half-block area
- Conduct both during arrival and dismissal time
- Pre planning for coordinator
  - Scout out location(s) beforehand
  - Recruit volunteers
  - Review tools, instructions and definitions prior to observation
  - Complete the first page of the observation sheet

### Using the Tool

#### After Observation

- Calculate number and percent of people engaging in an unsafe behavior by mode
- Additional guidance on calculation and interpretation provided in user guide





#### That's A Lot of Data!

- Both tools will inform your local initiative
- Developing a system for information to be submitted to state organizations to look at results across the state – this is in development





### Purpose of the Pilot

- Test usability and effectiveness of the two new tools
- Clarify state level data collection, processing and storage
- Inform any final revisions prior to lanch for 2018-19 school year







### Scope of the Pilot

- Focus on two tools
  - School Environment and Policy Self-Assessment
  - School Zone Hazard Observation Assessment
- 6 to 12 schools
- Each school will test both by April 13
- Required training call March 8, 9 or 12

Deadline to sign up for Pilot is Feb 28
